\*You must try to include the following information in your project to achieve your best grade:

- · The nationality of the artist.
- The subjects and themes which the artist liked to use for painting.
- The names and photos of at least two other pictures which the artist painted.
- · The styles and painting techniques used by this artist
- · What he was trying to achieve in his painting
- · Some other information about the artist's life and work.

Don't give anyone else your answers as they should be doing this on their own!
